A dozen segments of ore, weighing from 50 to 300 pounds and containing a high percentage of antimony, were taken from the shaft. The vein was only six feet under the ground, and appeared to extend for a considerable distance. The operators opened a shaft to a depth of 10 feet and continued to bring out large chucks of ore today. Some experienced miners said the vein mappeared to be the mother lode of that vicinity, where thousands of tons of antimony were mined before and during the World war.

A Joplin (Mo.) company has sent a buyer to Gillham and opened an office and warehouse. Laboratory equipment has been installed for testing the antimony content of ore brought to the warehouse.


